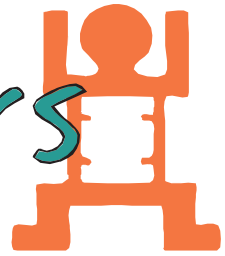

About Kiya Survivors:

Kiya (Quilla) is the Quechua word for moon, the symbol of new beginning.

Kiya Survivors aims to provide a new beginning for Peruvian children and young people who have learning difficulties, disabilities and/or are from vulnerable homes.

Kiya Survivors operates its volunteer programme to ensure that there are enough hands to help with the young people we endeavour to support in Peru, to encourage new ideas and enthusiasm amongst the staff and to help raise funds for our projects. Founded in 2001, the Kiya Survivors volunteer programme is an invaluable building block that has enabled Kiya Survivors to expand and provide professional care and help to many children and young people in need.

Our volunteer programmes are designed to give volunteers the opportunity to visit and live in a fabulous country whilst making a positive difference to the lives of disadvantaged children, young people and their families. Volunteering with Kiya Survivors promotes individual development and is a rewarding and fun experience!

At Kiya Survivors, one of our main aims is to educate families and communities on disabilities to encourage understanding and acceptance and thus break away from the belief that many communities still hold, that children born to be different are a curse.

How is my money spent?

Like many small charities running a volunteer programme, we rely on the donations from volunteers to keep going. Once we've covered the costs of you joining the programme, the remainder of your donation goes directly to the projects.

Our Staff:

We employ a full team of professionals onsite in Peru, all of whom are Peruvian and from the local area, including: Speech and Physiotherapists; Teacher; Psychologist; Social Worker; Project Director.

Your work in Peru will make the most of your individual talents and skills. We need people to help with sex education programmes in local schools & parent support programmes along with art and community projects.

There are also opportunities to participate in the Kiya Survivors outreach programmes, working alongside our professional Physiotherapist, Speech therapist and Psychologist. We also need people to help teach English to our Peruvian staff, children and parents. Practical skills such as: building, decorating, woodwork, gardening and admin skills are also helpful. There are many opportunities, the experience is beneficial to all who come and we work hard at utilising our volunteer's talents and skills.

Some of the activities you can get involved in:

Assisting in the classrooms and preparing dynamic workshops.

Working closely with locally employed people in various projects.

Helping with art classes and going to the park with the children.

Helping organize after school / homework clubs.

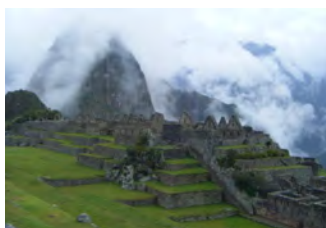
Assisting with Physiotherapy and parent workshops.

Where will I live?

When you volunteer at Mama Cocha, you will be living in Mancora, a small yet thriving fishing village on the North Coast of Peru.

Mancora is famous for its surfing, beach life, good weather all year round and fabulous cuisine.

There are fantastic markets where you can buy fresh produce and plenty of restaurants and cafes to explore.

Mancora is within easy reach to Ecuador, the local Manglares and waterfalls, mud baths and fantastic beaches, to mention but a few of the exciting destinations you can visit in your free time!

Kiya Survivors can help organize a private flat or room in a local family house for your stay here near to the projects and team so you feel supported.

Do I Need To Speak Spanish?

It is helpful to have a basic understanding of Spanish as our onsite team don't speak English, however, there are opportunities to learn Spanish upon arrival and you will have the support of an English speaker throughout your programme online.

Raising Funds?

We advise volunteers to set up a Just giving page and raise the donation aspect of the programme by organising small events, asking friends and family to sponsor them and asking colleges or their place of work to match fund their efforts. We are happy to help set things up for you and work together to help you raise the suggested donation for your time in Peru with us.

*All funds raised must be paid to Kiya Survivors

*By signing the pledge you are agreeing to commit to providing the agreed funding and costs for your programme.

*Volunteers must have medical and travel insurance. Kiya Survivors is NOT responsible for any accident; illness; loss or theft of personal items or cancellation/change of dates of any organised activities.

*All monies paid to Kiya Survivors are non refundable under any circumstances.



How will I know What To Do?

Once you arrive in Peru, our Project Director will provide an orientation followed by a training program to ensure you have all the knowledge you need to make the most out of your time with Kiya.

You will spend the first few days shadowing the staff at the projects and they will demonstrate and explain thoroughly what they do and how you could help them. You will then discuss with the charity's top and local team and decide a timetable that works for you. It could be working in the therapy team in the mornings and then running an English class for the kids in the afternoons, or organizing a sporting or art event. Whatever you do, you will be supported and given the tools needed to achieve your full potential!

When can I start?

We send volunteers all year round. Most of our volunteers sign up between 2-12 months before departure, as this gives you the opportunity to raise the funds to go, prepare, and receive all relevant information. If you want to join a programme leaving in less than 2 months please contact us to discuss.

How do I apply?

It's simple! The process goes like this:

1. Fill in the Application Form and sign the Pledge. Send it to our team. It's fine to send us a scan of the completed form.
2. Once we have received the form and approved the programme, you need to send a deposit, we can secure your place and start making plans for your trip once the deposit has been received.
3. We will ask you for a criminal records/ background check. If you don't have one, we can start an application for you for a minor cost (UK residents only) or direct you to a relevant organisation (outside UK).
4. Soon after the final donation for your programme has been received, you'll be sent a detailed itinerary.
